The Man Putin Couldn't Kill (C4, 10pm)

Last August, Alexei Navalny – Russia's opposition leader and thorn in Vladimir Putin's side – was settling down to watch his favourite cartoon, Rick and Morty, on a flight between Tomsk and Moscow when he started to feel ill. The plane diverted and he was rushed to hospital; another victim of Novichok poisoning. The slick spy-film stylings of this documentary can't hide the sinister repression and violence at the heart of its startling story many of those contributing have been harassed or imprisoned since being interviewed, not least Navalny. Still, there remains absurdity in an assassination attempt where a pair of dark blue underpants are a vital plot point. Victoria Segal

Fred And Rose West — Reopened (ITV, 9pm)

In February this year, a documentary crew began a private investigation to follow leads in the Fred and Rose West cases that were never chased up by police, including rumours of as many as 20 more murder victims. With their discoveries now handed over to the authorities, who are making inquiries, Sir Trevor McDonald joins a team including a former detective chief inspector, Colin Sutton, investigative psychologist Donna Youngs and author and West obsessive Howard Sounes to present what they can of the results. It is sensitively handled, careful and still utterly disturbing work. Helen Stewart
