DOCUMENTARY OF THE WEEK

A small boy shuffles in a chair as a woman asks in a kindly voice: "I want you to tell me about the last time you saw Mummy." He's six years old and his mother, Natalie Hemming, has disappeared. On the night she

vanished he heard loud noises in the living room: "It felt like thunder." Weeks later Natalie's body is found naked in woodland. She'd been beaten to death by her husband Paul.

This absorbing but painfully sad documentary follows the police investigation from the first emergency call made by Natalie's mother.

What emerges, quite apart from the

processes of an urgent police inquiry that starts as the hunt for a missing person, is a story of an unhappy woman abused by a controlling man.

We hear from Natalie's close and loving family as they face the inevitable. "I can't imagine not being able to speak to her again,"says her sister. AG See feature: page 22
