No forgiveness: a victim confronts her abuser

The Family Secret, an emotionally draining film. presented something of a moral puzzle box, filled with questions about crime and punishment, forgiveness or lack thereof, and the resolution of trauma All in an hour sandwiched between How to Save £1000 Online and First Dates — you can't say Channel 4


doesn't offer something for everyone. Being built around a face-to-face meeting between a child-abuse victim and the perpetrator, it was intensely

uncomfortable; the kind of thing that, for all the bravery of its participants, might have left you feeling grubbily voyeuristic for peering in on a family's ordeal. However, Anna Hall's film had a sense of tact, with something important to say about how a child victim of abuse can be unequipped to speak up.

Gradually, what happened to Kath 25 years ago was revealed; how, as a seven-year-old, she was sexually abused by her brother, Robert, three or four years older. He continued to do this for four years. Here, Kath and Robert were reunited in a room, with their mother, as Kath made the courageous step of facing her demon. Robert (whose face wasn't shown) sat opposite Kath and began: "It all started one night at Grandad's..." Kath sat quietly, showing tremendous dignity in not leaping up and clawing his eyes out.

Unlike other TV summits that have reunited victims and perpetrators, this turned out not to be a lesson in forgiveness. Kath ended the meeting by telling Robert: "I can't forgive you for what you did. You will always be my brother, I can't do anything about that But you're still the rapist who came into the bedroom." One hopes that this confrontation proved cathartic for her.

But what to make of Robert? He sounded genuinely remorseful and said: "I can't forgive myself... I hope people can realise that people can

change." Clearly, he hoped that TV would be the medium most likely to advance that process. Without really knowing anything more about him (how had he been unable to fathom the consequences of his actions? Has he really changed?), it was a bit hard to know what to feel about him beyond the revulsion at his monstrous boyhood transgressions. He clearly does have a conscience, though Kath should know that this will act as its own form of perpetual vengeance.

Takaya: Lone Wolf was as much about Cheryl Alexander, a Canadian environmentalist, as it was about the wolf with which she has become obsessed. She has shot more than 1,000 hours of footage of him as he roams an archipelago off Vancouver Island.

Takaya's home is a scenic place, bordering on the spiritual, and its beauty provided its own restful reason to keep watching a very Canadian kind of hour — polite, outdoorsy, equable. Even Cheryl's husband was gracious about there being three in his marriage, telling us with a rictus smile: "Cheryl is up before dawn and out there all day, day after day, week after week...

Well, Takaya is indeed a loveable beast. Until, that is, we saw what he liked to do with his food; decapitating seals before peeling off their skin "like a banana" during killing sprees. It made vou wonder if he has gone slightly insane in his solitude.
